# **PROMOTIONS**

With the completion of the first 12 months of operation it has been decided to rationalise the organisation structure in order to provide a structure which is more clearly suited to the presently established operating phase.

Therefore as a result of a recent review Mr. D. C. Vernon, BCL general manager, has announced the following changes effective from Monday August 20, 1973.

- Mr. R. B. Hope becomes manager engineering and technical services responsible to the general manager.
- Mr. H. George becomes manager financial control responsible to the general manager.
- Mr. A. J. Thuli becomes manager planning and co-ordination responsible to the general manager.
- Mr. C. P. Bishop becomes manager industrial engineering responsible to the general manager.
- Mr. M. R. L. Blackwell becomes mine manager responsible to the assistant general manager production.
- Mr. R. L. Kay becomes pit superintendent responsible to the mine manager.
- Mr. J. C. Hort becomes pit maintenance superintendent responsible to the mine manager.
- Mr. J. E. Dunlop becomes chief mine engineer responsible to the mine manager.
- Mr. K. A. Edwards becomes manager personnel services responsible to the assistant general manager - administration.
- 10. Mr. M. B. Pears becomes manager localisation and training responsible to the assistant general manager - administration.

Also effective from August 20 the following changes were made:

- Feople responsible to the manager engineering technical services are now: Power superintendent; maintenance superintendent - electrical and mechanical; civil works superintendent; senior engineer - engineering services; port superintendent; supply superintendent.
- People responsible to the manager personnel services are now: Employee services manager; essential services manager; senior medical officer; personnel officer (records); personnel officer (salaries and benefits); industrial relations manager; transport superintendent.
- People responsible to the manager localisation and training are now: Personnel and localisation manager; technical training superintendent; training development officer, education supervisor, industrial psychologist.
- People responsible to the manager financial control are now: Controller; company secretary.

The public affairs officer is now responsible to the assistant general manager - administration,

Also effective from the same date, the concentrator manager is now responsible for the metallurgical operations at the port and for this reason the port operations supervisor is now responsible to the concentrator superintendent.

Announcing these changes, Mr. Vernon said: "I am sure that these proposed changes in the organisation structure will result in more effective use of the manpower available and I look forward to the continued support and co-operation of every member of the staff".





The exercise room will be open to all from 10 am - 10 pm 7 days a week. However occasionally it may be reserved for training classes etc;

and for ladies sessions.

Individual sporting bodies i.e. basketball, boxing, badminton will be permitted to make a nominal charge for spectators to help defray such costs as sending teams away. These bodies will be responsible for manning the doors,

collecting money and banking.

Squash Centres: - Open 10 am - 10 pm 7 days a week. Charge :- If a member of the squash club 50 cents per court per 2 hour. Nonmembers - \$1.20 per court per  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour. The squash club has a block booking on two courts three nights a week but that still leaves one court available.

> Bookings have to be made in person to the squash court attendants in the squash courts.

If any section of the facilities are hired for functions such as dances or parties a small deposit will be required to cover cleaning. If the function is to be "wet", a special licence  $\underline{\text{MUST}}$ be held at the time of the booking.



### A "POWERFUL" TRAINING PROGRAMME


One of the responsibilities of the power distribution section is the maintenance of the 132 K.V. tower transmission lines which supply power to the mine operation from Loloho. A training programme has begun to train Papua New Guinean linesmen and lines apprentices in the rapid repair of towers which may have fallen down or been damaged in bad weather.

Material for the contruction of temporary towers is extremely light and can easily be carried to the work site under bad weather conditions. Panzer mast poles (tubular sectioned) are utilised in conjunction with epoxy glass cross-arms to which insulators are attached. Aluminium conductors are strung between the mast poles to bridge the gap around the fallen towers.

Without power to the mine the whole operation would be in danger of running to a standstill. With this in mind every effort is being made to train indigenous lines employees in the rapid, safe and efficient repair of the tower transmission lines.



Long ago in Wara village in South Nasioi lived a young man called Pakumei. While walking along the track one day he noticed a "dokitaro" bird building its nest high up on a tree. He decided he would catch this bird after it had had its young, and then he would make a good meal out of the whole family.

But close by lived a "tambaran" (bush spirit) which also had its eye on the dokitaro. It was waiting for the bird's little ones to get fatter so that it could have a delicious meal.

When the dokitaro family was good and fat Pakumei crept up to the tree and began climbing. He grabbed the birds and began to climb down. But the birds cried out and the tambaran heard.

"Who's up there stealing my bird", shouted the tambaran. "Come down here". Pakumei, in fear, shouted back, "You can have the birds". And then he threw down a branch from the tree, pretending it was the birds.

He took off into the bush with the tambaran chasing close behind. He jumped into a stream and hid under a waterfall. The tambaran knew Pakumei was there somewhere but couldn't find him. When he had wantered away, Pakumei jumped out of his hiding place and ran back to the village.

He told the people that he had been in a fight with a tambaran and that they must arm themselves. The day was spent in preparing "pakos" and bows and arrows against the tambaran. But when night came the tambaran brought hundreds of his friends and overran the village.

Although are people put up a strong defence they were wiped out. All except one man who escaped and ran off to Damausi village, near Daratui. He told the people what had happened and that was how the story was preserved.

Wara village is near Marai Catholic Mission. If you visit the village you can still see the bones of the people killed in the fight against the tambarans.

#### PRESENTATION OF PROFICIENCY CERTIFICATES


On August 17 a barbecue was held at the Loloho recreational centre to mark the presentation of proficiency certificates to concentrator indigenous personnel.






Papua New Guinea has a new definitive stamp issue on the market. One of the stamps shows our very own Bagana volcano erupting furiously.

#### BALL MILL LINER CHANGE

On August 20 the concentrator maintenance section entered a new phase. For the first time an all indigenous crew was engaged in the change out of primary ball mill liners. In the past this work has been performed by a composite crew of indigenous and expatriate personnel.

The job involved the removal and replacement of 280 chrome moly steel shell liners each weighing 535 lbs. Use of a special machine called a 'mill liner handler' allowed safe accurate handling of the heavy steel sections.

Founded by the Marist Fathers in 1901 the Kieta Mission first stood in a temporary rough hut on the Kieta beach but was later moved to Makaki on the top of the hill now overlooking Bougainville Enterprises. The church at Makaki was abandoned after the war and the mission moved to Tubiana near the sea below. Parts of the Makaki church still stand and its old graveyard is still in use.
