




GEOLOGY OF BOUGAINVILLE

SECTION THROUGH BOUGAINVILLE

Bougainville and Buka islands lie on a volcanic and earthquake belt that surrounds the Pacific Ocean and continues around the world following the mountain chains of the Himalayas, Alps, Andes and Rockies.

In the last decade geologists have been studying this world-wide pattern (see fig 1) and have satisfactorily explained it by suggesting movement of large plate-like areas of the earth's crust often of continental or oceanic size. Obviously such movement cannot go unhindered; collision occurs, earthquakes are generated, volcanoes form islands like Bougainville in bead-like chains, mountains are pushed up, and continents drift, resulting in a gradual reshaping of the earth's surface.

It is believed that these giant plates move at speeds varying from 6 - 100 millimetres a year. Not fast one might think, but sufficient over millions of years to change the world significantly.

Figure 2 shows what happens beneath Bougainville. The Solomon Sea plate moves north-eastwords beneath the South Pacific plate, drawn by connection currents in the liquid mantle beneath. The collision zone beneath the island and earthquakes originate from this zone as the plates rub together.

How was Bougainville actually formed? Millions of years ago rocks from the floor of the Solomon Sea melted as they moved downwards beneath the collision zone. They then rose, breaking to the surface of the sea and forming the older volcanic foundations of Bougainville.


The growth is continuing today at the active volcanic area of Bagana (see fig. 3).

Coral reef formed around the coast of the young Bougainville, in the same way as those around our present shores. In what is today the Keriaka area the ancient coral reef grew by the downwarping of the sea bed to a thickness of at least 1,300 metres. Later the reef was uplifted to its present level of 1,300 metres above sea level.

Buka island was largely formed by the same process but the coral reef was not uplifted to the same extent.

Sometimes volcanic pipes have carried minerals to the surface in Bougainville's mountain ranges. At Panguna water escaped from the molten rock, transporting copper sulphide minerals to the surrounding, cooler, fractured rock where the minerals were deposited as ore. Erosion by rivers removed the volcano at Panguna and sculptured the land surface to the form we know today.



GOURMETS CORNER

As an alternative to the usual kind of barbeque here's my special recipe for shishkabab.

Take a medium size leg of lamb and remove sinews and grease. Bone out and dice into $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch cubes. Marin in yoghurt, onion and bayleaf. Leave for a day and i the meantime prepare thick slices of raw onion, green pepper and tomatoes. Place meat, bayleaf and vegetab one after another on as many skewers as needed.

Take a grill out of the oven and place it over a hot bed of coals. Grease the grill and when the coals ar cooled slightly place the sheshkebab on the grill. W cooked to personal taste place the skewers on a large bed of pilaf rice and serve.

To make ris pilar melt 4 oz of butter, chop l'z onions and fry slightly; add four cups of rice, stir and coo slightly. Cover with chicken stock and a pinch of saffron, bring to boil, stir, cover with lid and finish off in an oven.








Above and Left, the scenes during the ceremony of the presentation of certificates.

Toniva's Everyman's Welfare Centre, the only second one of its kind in the whole of Papua New Guinea (the first one being in Port Moresby), was officially opened by the District Commissioner for Bougainville, Dr. Alexis Sarei, on September 22.

Construction of the centre commenced in January, 1972, and has just been completed recently. The erection of centre, three buildings and a basketball court was carried out by the students of Kieta Vocational Centre under the supervision of their principal, Mr. Graeme Furlong, who is also the chairman of Everyman's Kieta committee. The Centre includes study rooms, alibrary, a recreation hall, which can also be converted into a cinema when there are films to be shown, and a canteen.

Everyman's is a Christian interdenominational service organisation sponsored by Campaigners for Christ P.N.G. It is not a church. Commenced in Port

Moresby in 1955, Everyman's seeks, in co-operation with churches and other volunteer organisations, to meet the social, spiritual and physical needs of young people regardless of race, tribe, mission or status. Everyman's is a member of the Evangelical Alliance of PNG and an associate member of the Melanesian Council of Churches.
